CALL TO ORDER AND FLAG SALUTE:

Mayor Pro-Tempore Mahelona called the meeting to order at 7:32 p.m. Community Development Director Thomas led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Pro-Tempore Mahelona excused Mayor Wise and Mark Bauer.

PUBLIC HEARING:

A. Utility Allocation, Ordinance No. 2342

Mayor Pro-Tempore Mahelona read the Public Hearing procedures.

MAYOR PRO-TEMPORE MAHELONA OPENED THE PUBLIC HEARING ON UTILITY ALLOCATION AT 7:45 P.M.

Mayor Pro-Tempore Mahelona asked the Council and the City Clerk if they have received any communication regarding this issue.

City Clerk and Council Members replied that they had not.

Staff Report:

Public Works Director Searcy stated that in 1998, Ordinance No. 1987 allocated 500 single family equivalent (SFE) utility connections to various land use categories. In 2002, Ordinance No. 2093 allocated the remaining 256 SFEs of utility capacity to residential lots of record, development and other various uses. In 2006 Ordinance No. 2329 allocated an additional 89 SFEs for single family residential development. Approximately 154 SFEs of the 256 allocated remain unused. The application process set forth by Ordinance No. 2329 has resulted in 13 of the 89 SFEs remaining unused, 9 of the 15 SFEs set aside for septic system conversion remain unused therefore 176 SFEs are available for allocation. The city has granted preliminary plat approval to two residential developments without allocating the necessary utility capacity to serve all of the approved lots. Ordinance No. 1987 and 2093 have previously recognized that approved preliminary plats should have priority of available utility connections. Approved preliminary plats are able to put utility connections to use more quickly than perspective developments that have not yet submitted a land use application. Staff recommends approval.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ENUMCLAW, WASHINGTON, ESTABLISHING AN AVERAGE MONTHLY PAYMENT PLAN FOR UTILITY CUSTOMERS OF THE CITY TO EQUALIZE MONTHLY UTILITY PAYMENTS.

Staff Report:

Finance Director Smalling stated that the City currently offers a “Budget Payment Plan” for natural gas customers. This revision of the Municipal Code will broaden the program to include all utilities. The “Average Monthly Payment Plan” (AMP) will simplify the process and broaden its appeal. Only utility customers in good standing may apply for the AMP. The plan will run from July 1st to June 30th. Enrollment will be from May through September. The monthly payment is determined by dividing the estimated billing by the remaining number of months. The customer shall pay this amount through May. Settlement of accounts will occur by June 30th of each year. In the event utility rates increase, or if there is unusual utility consumption, the City may revise the monthly payment to eliminate exceptional balances. Smalling then asked Council if there could be a consensus to do this with all utilities.

Council Comments:

Beckwith stated that he was OK with all utilities being under one bill. He then asked if the invoice would show how much is in the excess balance.

Searcy stated that it would not, because it would get too complicated.

Coats asked if a person had an option of having a portion of their utilities on an AMP.

Smalling stated that it was all or nothing.

Ennis stated that it was mentioned that the City would track exceptional balances during the year; will these averages be adjusted monthly?

Smalling stated that it will be a fixed amount; adjustments will only be made if something out of the ordinary happens such as a natural gas price influx.

Ennis asked if a policy has been established for customers if a change is needed.

Smalling stated yes, the City would contact customer if an adjustment is needed but the average is intended to stay the same each month; there is a running average for customers to view.

Hogan asked for an explanation of the 5 month window for opting into the program.

Smalling stated that customers, by starting in the summer time, are building up a balance to help offset the higher winter bills.

Mahelona asked what a qualifying customer is.

Smalling stated that the customer must have at least 6 months history in their current residence on which to the average.

Mahelona asked what would happen if the 6 month history was mostly summer months.

Smalling stated that the City would take the summer months into consideration and make the best estimate that they could.

Mahelona inquired if there was a particular reason that the customer was having to but money up front instead of the City of Enumclaw.

Smalling stated that this is to avoid having to take customers to collections.

Mahelona asked if there is a potential problem if the customer pays more than they owe up front because of winter usage.

M. Reynolds stated that if the customer closes the account the account will be reconciled.

Hogan asked if the usage goes up or down during the year, will staff review and let customer know.

Smalling stated that there are reports that will show aberrations.

Hogan asked if customers with only one utility could use this program.

Smalling stated that the Ordinance reads that you could even if you have one utility.

Coats pointed out a correction to be made in section 5.

Smalling stated that it will be corrected before the next reading.

Coats asked what if the utility was shut off for some time prior to new customer usage, how would the City estimate an average.

Smalling stated that they would use estimates to calculate.

Council consensus was to bundle the utilities.

B. RESOLUTIONS

1. Resolution No. 1224 – Professional Services contract with The Transpo Group for a SR 410 Corridor Study

RESOLUTION NO. 1224

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF ENUMCLAW, KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR TO EXECUTE A LOCAL AGENCY STANDARD CONSULTANT AGREEMENT WITH THE TRANSPRO GROUP, INC. FOR THE SR 410 CORRIDOR STUDY PROJECT.

Staff Report:

Public Works Director Searcy stated that in August 2006 Council authorized a Local Agency Agreement with WSDOT allowing the city to obligate Federal transportation funds for the completion of a SR 410 Corridor Study. In September 2006 staff was notified that \$65,000 was available for such. The 2007 budget provides \$90,000 for this project with \$25,000 of REET funds as the City's revenue match for this project. The purpose of the study is to develop a corridor plan along SR 410 from Semanski Street to Mt. View Drive. On February 20, 2007, staff interviewed three consultants interested in completing the study. The Transpo Group was selected as the most qualified. Staff has negotiated a scope of services, schedule and fee projection of \$104,500. The total fees would exceed the current project budget by \$14,500 despite eliminating the task of public input or open house meetings by the consultant and significantly reducing the scope of environmental review. The City suspects that the fees are higher than expected due to the budget being established over two years ago. Staff recommends approval.

Council Comments:

Ennis asked why the corridor is stopping short of 244th.

Searcy stated that the City defined corridor in grant applications and the consultant did not recommend due to budget constraints.

Ennis asked if since this is a state highway will WSDOT have any input into the study.

Searcy stated that WSDOT will be involved in the design standards planning and throughout the process.

Ennis asked why the focus was on PM traffic only.

Searcy stated that PM is the worst peak traffic problem; however there are other peaks in the day that will be looked at as well.

Ennis asked if freight traffic will be addressed more thoroughly.

Searcy stated that it is being discussed and the consultant is aware of truck traffic on the highway.

Jensen asked if the County would help extend the study to 244th.

Searcy stated that the City could ask.

Beckwith asked if a Public Meeting will be conducted.

Searcy stated that staff can handle a Public Meeting; the City does not want to pay the consultants to perform the public meeting.

Ennis asked what the cost would be to extend the study to 244th.

Searcy stated that they did not discuss the price; the hope is to concentrate on the area nearer to downtown.

Ennis stated that he would like the Council to decide if the City should go to 244th but pass the resolution tonight.

Committee Report:

Hogan stated that he thought this Highway Corridor Study would be a mini comp. plan type of study, however it is more of a traffic study and this study is necessary. A larger vision of the Corridor Study by Council could be handled by the CED Committee or in the budget process.

Hogan then stated that the PW Committee has reviewed this resolution and recommends approval.

Ennis asked if a Corridor Study is required to make changes on Highway 410.

Searcy stated that it is not required, individual improvements can be looked at.

Jensen asked if there would be any design elements to study.

Searcy stated that it is intended to look at streetscape concepts but not zoning issues.

Coats stated that he was not sure it was appropriate for the City to be paying for a traffic plan on a state highway.

Beckwith stated that the study was to maintain some consistency on development along the highway to build on for the future.

Hogan stated that the state will look at individual projects when the need arises. The City can spend money to ensure consistency and a holistic plan and lobbying the state to follow the City's plan. He then pointed out that \$65,000 is being paid by grant dollars.

Coats stated that he does not see any streetscape elements in the plan.

Searcy pointed out that they are on page 7 of 10.

ENNIS MOVED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 1224 AS PUBLISHED WITH THE ADDITION THAT ADMINISTRATION COMES BACK AT A FUTURE DATE WITH SOME COST ESTIMATES ON EXTENDING THE SCOPE TO 244TH. HOGAN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED 5-2, COATS AND L. REYNOLDS OPPOSED.

RESOLUTION NO. 1223

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF ENUMCLAW, KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON AMENDING RESOLUTION NO. 1206 AS TO AMEND FEES FOR BUSINESS LICENSES AND PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

Staff Report:

Public Works Director Searcy stated that Public Works has reviewed various fees it charges and is recommending additional fees and increasing/eliminating certain existing fees. He then listed the proposed changes. Staff recommends approval.

City Clerk Hopkins stated that part of the approval process for obtaining a business license is a background check that the Police Department performed through the Washington State ACCESS system at no cost. The purpose of the background check is in accordance with EMC, 5.02.070, to determine if an applicant has a conviction that may prevent their business license application to be approved. The ACCESS unit has been recently instructed by the FBI that terminal agencies, such as the City, cease this practice. The criminal conviction history that was obtained through the ACCESS system is available on-line through the State Patrol WATCH program at a fee of \$10.00. This new \$10.00 charge to the City is being recommended to be passed onto the new business license applicant. The business license application and renewal fees have not been increased since 1993. Hopkins then listed some of the current and proposed fees. Staff recommends approval.

Council Comments:

Beckwith asked what the policy is for turning the water off on the weekend.

Searcy stated that they have a minimum charge for after hour calls.

M. Reynolds asked why the FBI recommended Cities to stop using the ACCESS system.

Hopkins stated that the FBI felt it was not a safe or acceptable use of that system.

M. Reynolds asked if it is appropriate for a Municipality to continue to do a background check for business licenses.

Hopkins stated that the FBI does not want the ACCESS system used but is not discouraging Cities from performing background checks.

Committee Report:

Hogan stated that the Public Works Committee has reviewed Resolution No. 1223 and recommends approval.

L. Reynolds state that the Finance Committee has reviewed Resolution No. 1223 and recommends approval.

HOGAN MOVED TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 1223. L. REYNOLDS SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

a. Welcome Center by Mike Thomas, Community Dev. Director

Thomas stated that a detailed scope and the costing of the project have been reviewed.

b. Waste Water Treatment Plant by Chris Searcy, Public Works Director

Searcy stated that the Villa Vista Apartments sale is scheduled to be closed on May 30, 2007. Phase One Earthworks contract is being advertised; notice to proceed in July. The final design revisions are due on June 8th and the consultants are on track.

M. Reynolds stated that the Villa Vista will close on May 30, 2007, and the boundary line adjustment was taken care of. The covenants have been approved and will be recorded tomorrow also.

Ennis stated that the earthwork will be completed late July and the brick and mortar will be awarded in August, why is there a gap?

Searcy stated that the City wanted a gap in case there were any unknown complications between projects.

Beckwith asked what the status of Walker property is.

Searcy stated that by the agreement they need to be out by May 31, 2007; however the City has been made aware that their plans for another residence are currently being held up in King County permitting. At the next Council meeting a recommendation may be made to give a month to month lease for a couple of months as it does not need to be vacated during the earthworks.

Ennis stated that the Expo Committee met and discussed what the role of the Committee would be; should the Expo Committee handle all issues or should they go to other Committees in cases of overlap to get their input too. They then discussed the motion that was made to create the Expo Committee, it was not said that the Expo Committee would consist of members from three other Committees and they felt a new motion would be appropriate to specifically define the membership of the Expo Committee if it is decided that the Expo Committee will address the overlapping issues.

Coats stated that he felt that this Committee should deal with all things that have to do with the Expo Center.

BECKWITH MOVED TO DEFINE MEMBERSHIP OF THE EXPO CENTER COMMITTEE AS CS, CED AND FINANCE COMMITTEE MEMBERS. ENNIS SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

NEW BUSINESS:

Beckwith stated that the trees on Warner Ave. were topped and are against City Code. The Urban Forestry Committee wants to revisit the Tree Ordinance and set up penalties for violating codes. He also suggested setting aside certain streets within the community as boulevard streets where the City takes care of the maintenance. He then asked the CED Committee to review these issues.

Jensen asked whether a trained professional could train the public.

Beckwith stated that this is possible.

Ennis stated that as the CED Chair he would agree to discuss this issue.

BECKWITH MOVED TO SEND THE DISCUSSION OF A NEW LOOK AT THE CITY'S CODE ENFORCEMENT AND LANGUAGE OF THE STREET TREE ORDINANCE TO THE CED COMMITTEE. ENNIS SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.

Coats asked if there is an existing penalty for topping trees.

M. Reynolds stated that it is currently just an infraction.

L. REYNOLDS MOVED TO ADJOURN THE MEETING. HOGAN SECONDED. MOTION CARRIED 7-0.
